

Dear Neighbor,

Where will you sleep tonight?

For over 400 people last year in Wabash County, over 100 of whom were children, there was no easy answer to that question. The answer may have been to sleep in their cars, in abandoned buildings, or under bridges. Others know where they will sleep tonight, but will be evicted and out on the street at the end of the week because they can't make their rent payment. These people found themselves homeless for a wide variety of reasons; job less, fleeing an abusive situation with their children, mental or physical disability, increase in rent beyond their means, coming out of incarceration or rehabilitation, or perhaps their home burned and was underinsured.

What does it mean to be homeless?

- · Can only own what you can carry and protect
- Must rely on public facilities for personal care and hygiene
- Against the law to loiter without a visible means of support
- Need an address to escape homelessness
 - To fill out a job application
 - To apply for rent
 - To register children for school
 - To receive mail and packages

Housing insecurity is a Wabash County problem.

In 2021, many households in Wabash County struggled with housing insecurity including 1,630 below the federal poverty line, and 3,125 more were ALICE (Asset Limited, Income Constrained, Employed) households.* These are households where folks were employed, but in an insecure housing situation. They are often one crisis (injury, illness, fire, car breakdown, etc.) away from homelessness. The median wage in the County was not quite enough to afford a two-bedroom apartment. The situation for renters is even more dire. It would take three average renters wages, working full-time, to afford an average two-bedroom apartment.



Glimmers of hope.

Housing Action of Wabash County (HAWC) is a consortium of Wabash County nonprofits, government agencies, and churches whose missions and clientele bring them into contact with homeless and other low income families and individuals. After meeting informally for more than 10 years, HAWC recently incorporated to bring focus to this problem by advocating for the housing insecure, applying for corporate and government grants, and appealing to the good people of Wabash County. We have recently made some important strides.

- Emergency Shelter: In cooperation with the City of Wabash and Advantage Housing, HAWC now provides emergency short term housing to homeless individuals and families through an agreement for reduced rates at a local motel. Although funding currently limits us to providing emergency housing for only three rooms, well below the level of need of 10 12 rooms, it is a hopeful start for a county that has had no emergency shelter in the past.
- Housing Helpline: We have established a Housing Helpline that will connect those in Wabash County needing housing assistance to a Navigator who will review their current situation and direct them to available community resources.
- Monthly Community Partners Meeting: This monthly meeting is
 designed for all of the community to come together once a month to
 collaborate and discuss housing needs, to share success stories, and
 bring awareness to upcoming events that organizations are providing in
 the community. Networking is a critical tool used to connect the
 individual in need with the correct service to aid them in their crisis.

STEPS TO HOUSING SECURITY

STEP 1

Emergency Housing

Goal: Get people off of the street and into a safe and secure environment as quickly as possible Resources Provided: HAWC provides a needs assessment and referral services to community

resources.

STEP 2

Transitional Housing

Goal: Equip people with

the skills they need to be successful by creating a long-term housing plan Resources Provided:
HAWC provides mandatory housing counseling to help overcome the housing barriers unique to each

guest.

STEP 3

Permanent Housing

Goal: Long-term housing that is safe, healthy, and affordable

Resources Provided: HAWC partners have connections with community landlords who are willing to work with this population. HAWC and its partners provide home start-up materials such as beds (Sleep Solutions), housewares, and furniture.
